Doc Halleck Recovers His Stolen Microscope

Doc Halleck was a small-town General Practitioner, but with big-city smarts.

For my birth until I moved away 7 years later, Doc Halleck was my doctor. From the farm town of Winamac in northwest Indiana, he shared the healthcare of the Pulaski County population of about 12,000 in the 1950s with four or five other physicians.

As a young child, I hated visiting Doc Halleck. His office “smelled funny” (likely Lysol), and I usually had to drop my pants and get a shot. While those inoculations were for my own good, between the indignity and the needle sting, I was very unhappy. In fact, at the tender age of 4, I once expressed my dissatisfaction with him and his needles with foul, foul language that I had heard from my father when he was drinking. My mother, a classmate of his nurse, Eva Ewing, was red-faced. But when my paternal grandmother heard, she was tickled pink.

Doc Halleck had come to Winamac in 1927 one year after graduating from Medical School at Indiana University.

In June of 1933, someone stole Doc Halleck's microscope from his practice. A month later after having given up recovering it, he went to Indianapolis to buy another used microscope from one of its many pawnshop. At one pawnshop, he found his original microscope.

Later that fall, when he purchased his first x-ray machine, you can be sure it was firmly bolted to the floor.

It was another 30 years, before I saw him again. I returned for my great uncle Bill's visitation and funeral. Feeling confident at 36, I introduced myself to Doc Halleck, expecting a broad smile and a glad hand. He barely acknowledged my greeting. Either he had forgotten me over the intervening 30 years, or he remembered my foul mouth at 4.

**New X-Ray Apparatus
Has Modern Features**

A modern X-ray machine has this week been installed in the office of Dr. H. J. Halleck. It is described as one of the latest models, mounted on wheels so that it is easily moved and turned in any position. The equipment is entirely shock proof, thus eliminating much of the danger of operating some of the older machines.

The shock proof feature is due to recent improvements by which all high-tension units are immersed in oil, similar to high-tension transformers. This enabled the builders to construct an apparatus in unusually compact form, making it easy of manipulation but detracting in no way from its power.

It is the same unit that has recently been installed in both the Logansport hospitals.

Doc Halleck gets X-ray

HALLECK INSTALLS X-RAY

Dr. H. J. Halleck, this week received one of the latest models of X-ray equipment in the form of a Victor shock-proof machine, built by the General Electric X-ray Corporation. A representative of the company was here until Wednesday when he completed setting up the apparatus and giving it a thorough test.

The X-ray is a neat, compact but powerful unit in which all danger of shock to patient or operator has been eliminated.

It is of the same type as that recently installed in the two Logansport hospitals.

This new equipment enables Dr. Halleck to make X-ray diagnosis and give moderate X-ray treatment.
