{This profile of my great uncle, George Phillips, starts with my knowledge of family history and expands with clippings from the two competing weekly newspapers of Pulaski County, Indiana in published during the 24-year period between 1924 and 1947. It ends with my recollections of George after my birth in 1947.}

In the first half of the 20th century, George Phillips lived a relatively regular life with two exceptions, the death of his new wife and the death of his younger brother during the Great Depression.

In 1905, George Phillips was born at home in Star City, a small farm town in northwestern Indiana. He was fifth of the seven children of John Clark "J.C." Phillips, a prominent grain dealer in Pulaski County, and Bertha Fay Reed Phillips. Five years earlier, the family had moved to Star City after Bertha's father purchased its grain elevator. J.C. and his father-in-law sold animal feed to farmers and bought their grain. Augers elevated the grain into tall silos where it was stored until other augers loaded it into boxcars parked along the adjacent railroad siding. The railroad took the grain to mills in Chicago and elsewhere in the Midwest for processing into food, particularly flour and cornmeal.

In 1924, George enrolled in high school in Long Beach, Calif. After his bout with pneumonia the year before, California was far from the brutal winters of the Midwest. During high school, he lived with Bertha's half-sister, Jess, and her husband, Billy

Meanwhile, Rose Hawkins, a family friend was completing her Home Economics degree at Indiana University. George's oldest brother, John, was also there, finishing medical school.

In 1928, George, now a high school graduate and likely working at the elevator, attended a basketball game in the small town of Stilwell, sixty miles north of Star City, where Rose coincidentally had started teaching.

In the spring of 1929, George, 24, and his brother, Bill, 27, bought a nearby farm to which Bill and his family moved. {Bill is my paternal grandfather.}

Rose spent that Thanksgiving with J.C.'s family, including George and other siblings living at home: Julia, 24, Tom, 21, and Mary, 19. In those days, unmarried adults frequently lived with the parents

During the next summer, George and Rose were likely also seeing each other in passing at Lake Winona, which is 60 miles east of Star City.

By spring of 1931, as the Great Depression started to affect their county, George and Bill sold their farm. In the fall, Rose was teaching home economics at the local high school.

Over the next few years, Rose frequently shared Thanksgiving dinner with George's family, and on at least one occasion, accompanied George and Tom to a baseball game in Chicago.

Rose had been a regular guest to the Phillips household and, in September 1934, she and George married in the rectory of her Roman Catholic church. (As a baptized Methodist, George would have been excluded from a traditional Catholic wedding in the church). After returning from a Canadian honeymoon and a stop at the Century of Progress Exhibition, aka "World's Fair", in Chicago, George and Rose settled into their own house in Star City.

Two weeks later, “[f]riends ... took them for a ride Friday evening in a truck over town and to Winamac.”¹ The ride was part of a “belling”, a rite for newlyweds. In years past, belling meant alcohol, firearms, and fireworks outside the bedroom window on the wedding night. But it was during Prohibition, and Star City didn’t have much of a rough crowd.

Star City was a small town, so George could walk to work at the elevator in less than 5 minutes, and for Rose, her school was just a block away. They probably ate lunch at home together most days. In those first weeks, George and Rose would have settled into a routine.

Just four months later in January 1935, Rose, first diagnosed with a sore throat related to a tooth infection, had contracted scarlet fever.

George’s brother, Dr. John Phillips, 36, came 60 miles from his home in Michigan City, IN., to review her case. Returning home Thursday with his wife, Fern, they had a serious car wreck on the January roads.

As Dr. John and Fern were being released from the hospital, Rose died back in Star City of kidney failure after a two-week battle. She was 34.

The day before her funeral and burial at the Catholic cemetery beside Rose’s church, “... the casket was placed at the [bay] window of the [J.C.] Phillips home and school children passed by in a body as a mark of respect.”²

Not only did George lose Rose, but also their unborn child. Rose was 3-months pregnant when she died according to her death certificate.

George’s friends were surely at a loss on how to help him. A few weeks later, they got George involved in a regional checkers tourney. {In the 24-year period of my research, this is the only reference to checkers in the two local weeklies, so I believe the tourney was created to help George. That’s how small communities roll.}. Over the next few weeks, George demonstrated that he was a strong member of the winning team.

By spring, George was confirmed in the Catholic church. (This would allow him to be buried beside Rose in the church cemetery. But that would never happen.)

By the summer of 1937, George was socially active again. Along with his father, George played "Donkey Baseball" for Star City against nearby Winamac, the county seat. As a charity fundraiser in the first half of the 20th century, communities could rent strings of donkeys. The beasts provided the locomotion for teams of community leaders as they played baseball or basketball games. The public readily bought tickets to see the spectacle. Later that fall, he also went to Mexico with two buddies.

The end of winter in 1939 brought new tragedy to the Phillips family. While newspaper reports said George's younger brother Tom, 28, contracted pneumonia, it was likely tuberculosis. After a three-month stay in a sanitarium in South Bend IN, about 70 miles to the north, Tom returned home under that care of a South Bend nurse, Elvina Wolf. Tom died that summer of tuberculosis. Serendipitously, after the death of this brother, George certainly found some comfort from Tom's former nurse, Ms. Wolf. But the distance between her home in South Bend and his home in Star City likely doomed the relationship.

By the next spring, J.C. purchased another grain elevator in Hamlet, about 40 miles north of Star City, and made George its manager.

In summer of 1941, George, 36, married Helen Medbourn Hand, 29. She had a two-year-old son from a previous marriage and was very sociable and active in the community of Culver, 20

miles north of Star City. Initially living in Hamlet, by 1942, they were living in Knox, a larger town also about 30 miles north of Star City, and just a few miles from his elevator in Hamlet.

By the 1950s, George and Helen were back in Culver, living on the shore of Lake Maxinkuckee.

{Here ends George's story based on my newspaper clippings over the past 24 years and my own recollections begin.}

As a child in the 1950s, I loved spending summer weeks at the lake shore home of my great uncle and aunt, George and Helen. Their large house had a spacious living room fully-windowed overlooking the lake. With my cousin, Maurine, I swam near the dock and Helen took us about the lake in her motorboat. Those were great childhood memories.

My other recollections of George were summer afternoons on the lawn in Adirondack chairs at the Star City family home, now in the trust of George's older sister, Julia. After Bertha died in 1943 and J.C. died in 1944, Julia became the much-loved matriarch of the family.

George worked with his brother (and my grandfather), Bill, and sister, Julia, at the Star City elevator until it was sold in 1953.

My last recollection of George was visiting with him at his elevator in Winamac IN in the early 1960s.

George died in 1964 of a heart attack. Originally, buried in Culver, Helen had his body and headstone moved to the Phillips family west section of the Star City IOOF cemetery.

While George and my other elders were alive, I wish I'd have been more curious about their recollections of their lives in the first half of the 20th century.

At the time of Rose's death in 1935, the Phillips family members are:

- J.C. (64), the patriarch, owns a grain elevator in a small farm town in northwestern Indiana, and is married to Bertha (61). Their children are:
 - Dr.John (36), their oldest, is a physician. His wife, Fern (36), is a homemaker with two daughters, Joan (10) and Betty (8).
 - Bob (35), is a farmer living 20 miles south of Star City. His wife, Letha (34) is a homemaker with a son, Bobby (15).
 - Bill (33), works at the family grain elevator. His wife, Dorcas (32), is a homemaker with two sons, Billy (10) and Tommy (8).
 - Julia (31), their older daughter, is a primary school teacher.
 - George (30), works at the elevator.
 - Tom (28), their youngest son, works at the elevator.
 - Mary (26), their younger daughter, is also a primary school teacher. She will marry Garland Masterson in 1937 and have a daughter, Maurine, in 1948.
- AuntJess (49), Bertha's half-sister, lives in Long Beach CA with her husband, UncleBilly Stephens (51).

Saturday, June 4, will be Alumni Day, with a breakfast for seniors, business meeting of alumni, election of alumni trustees, class reunions and luncheons, Chicago-Indianapolis alumni base ball game, Indiana-Minnesota Big Ten base ball tilt, a barbecue on Dunn Meadow at 6 p. m., an all-university sing in the stadium, a student play entitled "Craig's Wife," the Indiana Rose Dance, and an "I" men's smoker.

The Sunday program includes the baccalaureate address in the evening by Dr. Frank O. Ballard of Hanover College. Special services in the Bloomington churches, a trip to Brown county, a sacred concert by the university orchestra, and open house at the homes of I. U. faculty members are on the Sunday program.

The commencement day program opens with an alumnae breakfast and continues with the traditional flag raising, tree planting, peace pipe, and other class exercises, an alumni luncheon. Following the Waseda (Japanese)-Indiana base ball game in the afternoon, comes the induction of the seniors into the alumni ranks.







Doctor and Wife Hurt in Highway Accident

Dr. and Mrs. John Phillips of Michigan City, both formerly of Star City, were injured in an auto accident last Thursday evening while on their way home after a visit to relatives in this vicinity. Dr. Phillips had his right arm broken below the elbow and was cut by glass; Mrs. Phillips also received a number of lacerations, particularly about the throat, besides severe bruises.

Dr. Phillips had been called to Star City in consultation on the illness of his sister-in-law, Mrs. George Phillips. The doctor's wife accompanied him. They also stopped in Winamac for a brief visit in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Frank King. He had slowed down, it was stated, but the impact was sufficient to damage the car and injure both occupants.

Passersby took Dr. and Mrs. Phillips to a hospital at Michigan City. Subsequently, when garage-men went to get the car, it was found that instruments and medicines to the value of more than \$100 had been stolen from the wrecked machine.

DR. JOHN PHILLIPS NEAR DEATH IN CRASH

A serious accident occurred on State Road 29 near Michigan City Thursday when Dr. and Mrs. John R. Phillips were returning to their home after having been to Star City, where the doctor had been called in consultation for Mrs. George Phillips. The roads from Laporte on north were in the storm district and were a glare of ice. At a narrow bridge, four miles from Michigan City, a truck coming from the city, crossed the bridge, but instead of pulling to the side, held the center of the road. To avoid a collision with the truck, the doctor pulled out and ran into the abutment of the bridge.

He was thrown against the steering wheel and suffered a broken right arm and nose and numerous cuts and bruises. Mrs. Phillips was thrown through the windshield and was rendered unconscious. Her face was bruised and cut, one cut under the chin, which required eleven stitches to close, barely missed the jugular vein.

Help soon came from passersby and Mrs. Phillips was taken to St. Anthony's hospital, where she regained consciousness. Dr. Phillips, though dazed from shock, was able to give some assistance in the care of Mrs. Phillips.

The car was completely demolished and the doctor's instrument case and medicine case, which were forgotten in the excitement, were stolen from the car.

The children, Joan and Betty, were in school, and had not made the trip with their parents. Dr. Phillips was able to come to Star City Monday for a brief while.


